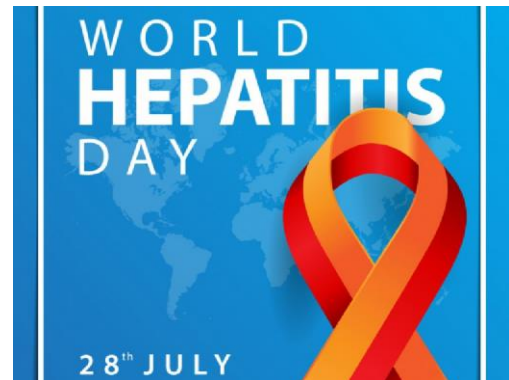

Dr.

Blumberg discovered the hepatitis B virus in 1967 and two years later he developed the first vaccine against hepatitis B and for these results he won the Nobel Prize.World Hepatitis Day is one of eight disease-specific official world health days designated by the World Health Organization.
